## CHAPTER I: COMMENCEMENT OF ANNALS OF MILLOM

1058. Harold's brother Tostig made Earl of Northumbria which included Cumbria down to the Duddon.  
Tostig held the 4 manors between Esk and Duddon.
1066. Death of Tostig at ~~Stamford~~ Stamford Bridge.  
William the Conqueror gave to Roger de Poitou the lands held by Tostig including the 4 manors of Mellin.
1075. About this date the battle of Godwin de Boyvil.  
There were two principal families holding lands in the district, de Cuypland and de Boyvil of whom the latter seems the principal.
- 1083 Roger in rebellion was deprived of his rights.
- 1086 In the Domesday Book the four manors are mentioned as being at one time belonged to Tostig and later held by Roger. - but no owners name given in the DB.

1057 William II succeed. One of his adherents Ivo de  
Tailbois had been given Hesudal. William II added some  
of the lands of Roger de Poitou - esp<sup>l</sup> the ships butts: Dik. Dudda

1096 William the Marshal went to crusade as vpr of his  
brother Ranulf - and under him would be some of his chief  
knights. It is supposed that Godard of Millau, a chief knight  
under Lucia fit Ivo who had received the Aquitaine in 1097,  
would be under W<sup>m</sup> the Marshal's leadership; and that for  
services rendered Ranulf. rewarded him with the lordship  
of Millau.

From c 1230 - 1250 no local documents seem to be witnessed  
by a lord of Millum. Adam de Millum may have died soon  
after 1230 - for Edward de Corney the Sheriff of the Castle  
appears to take his place. Joan may have been in wedlock  
as John de Hoddeston whom she married belonged to Lyndeham  
and she cannot have been m: much before 1242 or soon after that  
date as her eldest son John was apparently a minor at the

date of his father's death and the marriage of his mother.  
 John de Studeston\*, husband of Joan, was also very seldom at the  
 Castle - perhaps engaged in military duty or at other estates in  
 Lancashire & Yorkshire. After the death of Edward de Comyn  
 (exact date unknown) the chief position in the Council appears to  
 have been taken by Sir Guy de Baynol of Hertsanton and John de  
 Baynol his brother of Hawsmyr, and by Sir John de Langley who
